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CICRA releases results of fixed line customer satisfaction survey

The Channel Islands Competition and Regulatory Authorities' (CICRA's) second independent customer satisfaction survey into fixed line telecoms services in Guernsey has seen an improvement in customer satisfaction in most areas.

Sure is currently the only provider of fixed lines in Guernsey.

CICRA, which conducts the survey every six months, commissioned Island Analysis to survey 500 islanders asking them to give their opinion on the quality of service, billing and the level of customer service they had received from Sure.

The number of respondents who rated Sure's quality of service as satisfactory or highly satisfactory increased from 57% in May to 68% in November.

Customer satisfaction with the billing process improved by 13% with 66% of respondents rating Sure's billing as satisfactory or highly satisfactory - an increase from 53% in May.

Of the 21% of respondents, who had cause to contact customer services in the past six to 12 months, 44% rated their experience as either satisfactory or highly satisfactory – compared to 48% in May.

Just over a quarter (26%) of respondents said that, if the option was available, they would be likely or very likely to change provider (a decrease from 37% in May) with around half indicating that their decision would be driven by price.

CICRA director, Louise Read, said: "One of the aims of the initial survey was to bring greater transparency as to how the operators are perceived by their customers.

"Our expectation was that operators value their customers and would initiate improvements themselves. This second round of survey results suggest Sure has done that which is excellent news for customers.

"It is certainly encouraging that customer's satisfaction with Sure has improved since May 2004 and I would urge Sure to continue to listen and work with its customers, particularly in the area of customer services, to ensure that it is delivering the service levels that customers are demanding.

"There is scope for improvement and we want to better understand what Sure's customer services plans are; plans which may need to be complemented by quality of service standards. We are asking Sure to share their plans with us so we can best consider what the next steps should be."

CICRA has confirmed that it is working with operators to ensure customers will be able to buy their fixed line from other telecoms operators from June 2015.

Mrs Read said the ultimate goal is to stimulate competition to improve the quality of existing services and introduce new and innovative services into the market.

"Competition encourages telecoms operators to improve in order to retain existing customers and win new business," she said.

"Giving customers a choice of fixed line provider delivers benefits to all, not just those who decide to switch providers, and we are keen to ensure that customers have that choice as soon as possible."

Mrs Read said: "Providing new and existing customers with appropriate satisfaction data helps customers to make informed choices. Our biannual survey will include other fixed line operators as they come on board."

CICRA has also released the results of its independent Jersey survey of customer satisfaction with fixed line telecoms service provider JT - currently the only provider of landline services in Jersey.

This is the first of a series of three reports CICRA will issue. The second report, on mobile telecoms services, will be made public later this month and the final report, on broadband services, will be published shortly thereafter.

The Channel Islands Competition and Regulatory Authorities or 'CICRA' is the name given to the Jersey Competition Regulatory Authority (JCRA) and the Guernsey Competition and Regulatory Authority (GCRA) (formerly the Office of Utility Regulation). The JCRA was established under the Competition Regulatory Authority (Jersey) Law, 2001, and the GCRA was established under The Guernsey Competition and Regulatory Authority Ordinance, 2012. In Jersey, the telecoms and postal sectors are regulated by the JCRA, which is also responsible for administering and enforcing the Competition (Jersey) Law 2005. In Guernsey the telecoms, postal and electricity sectors are regulated by the GCRA, which is also responsible for the administration and enforcement of the Guernsey competition law since it came into force on 1 August 2012.
